


I. THE IRON CURTAIN DESCENDS

 - 2. U.S. refused to share the secrets of the Atomic Bomb
- Stalin refused to withdraw troops in Eastern Europe.
- Put Communists in control of Eastern European countries.
- Travel, trade, and communication restricted.

 - Greece and Turkey




IV. CONTAINMENT (CONT).



V. THE BERLIN AIRLIFT

- The Allies couldn't agree on what to do with Germany
- Instead of 4 zones now only 2
 - West-Democratic
 - <u>East</u>-Communist
- Berlin is split into four quadrants:
- Split between USA, USSR, France and England

- Stalin blockades West Berlin, cutting off food and supplies.
- He hoped the Allies would give up West Berlin

 USA begins airlifting food, medicine and supplies into West Berlin.




VII. NATO AND THE WARSAW PACT

- Pushed by the USSR to compete with NATO.






RED SCARE

THE ROSENBERGS

- The Rosenbergs
 - Julius and Ethel Rosenberg

 - The two were accused of passing atomic secrets to the Soviets.
 - The two were convicted in 1953 of espionage and sentenced to the <u>electric chair</u>

A Communist will usually deny that he is a Communist. There are many Communists who are not in reality card-carrying members of the party.

But both types of Communists carry on the same

work, although the second type cannot let it be known that he is a member. His real value to the party is in indoctrinating those unsuspecting people in key positions with government agencies, schools, unions and churches with Communistic philosophies.


When a Communist goes to work on you tell him that you are on to him and his dirty game.

Tell him, further, that you think it your patriotic duty to make his activities known to others and to the police.



While You Are in Shelter

Shelter living requires patience and devices to pass the time

YOUR life in shelter for two weeks, or a month, will depend much upon your mental attitude toward the situation. If you are determined to stick it out, if you realize this will be the hardest part, and a future awaits you because you will be alive, then you will be equipped to weather this all-important storm. Many people have false ideas about life in a shelter. Others merely shun the thought of such a life completely. These people can accept no type of life unless it involves the bridge table and the television set. Their chances for survival are, indeed, small.

Several tests have been made with people living in shelters. The reactions to life in a shelter by these people have been studied in an effort to uncover some of the psychological problems that will be faced by people living in shelter during a real emergency. One such test was conducted last fall by Mr. Edgar M. Perkins, 38, his wife, Jeannine, 31, their children, Richard, 10, and Sharon Ann, 5. This family spent seven days in a shelter test conducted near Washington in Prince Georges County, Maryland, During this time, they lived in a space, 9 feet wide by 10 feet long by 7 feet 4 inches high.

The first day for the Perkins family was fairly routine. They had no real problems, although the children got a little restless before dinner. This family, however, learned two important lessons the first

day:

1. Space is limited, and everything must be kept in place, or you tend to become







- China 1940s

 - Mao Zedong


III. CONTAINMENT IN ASIA (CONT).

- The Korean War 1950-1953
- War between the Republic of Korea (South Korea) and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (North Korea)
- After WWII, the Korean Peninsula was divided at the 38th Parallel
 - The North = Communist
 - The South = Capitalist/Republic
- 1950-North Korea crosses 38th Parallel
- President Truman uses emergency powers to protect South Korea from falling to the Communists.
 - United Nations Security Council votes to intervene and send troops
 - USA counts for 88% of foreign troops










